

It's Wild Mushroom Season! There are many wild edible mushrooms that naturally occur in our ecosystem. Mushrooms are high in protein and are good sources of vitamins and trace minerals. There are many types with varying flavor. Most mushrooms are not to be eaten raw, cooked is better. Here are a few common mushrooms to keep an eye out for.

\*\*\*When mushroom picking please make sure to use a good pocket guide or someone who is very familiar with mushrooms as there are many mushrooms that look like the ones that you know and can make you sick.\*\*\*

#### Angel Wings (pleurocbella porrigens)



Angel wings grow shelf-like on rotting conifers. Their small caps  $(1-2\frac{1}{2})$  broad) are fanned or tongue shaped and are bald and white when fresh. The stalk is absent or present as a stubby base. Thin gills, white, close together, shallow, running down the stubby base (if present).

They are a bit flimsier than oyster mushrooms and are often mistaken for their close relative, who is also edible.

The ground growing Chanterelle's are bright orange to yellow-orange cap, bald, usually concave or wavy when mature. The gills are often the same colour, running down the stalk and are well spaced, shallow, blunt edged and fairly thick. The stalk of the chanterelle is colored like the cap or slighty paler and solid (not hollow). Their flesh is white with a tinge of yellow.

Watch out not to mistake the chanterelle with the poisonous jack o' lantern mushroom which has thinner, more crowded gills and does not have while flesh. The false chanterelle has thinner, oranger gills and often a browner cap.

#### Chanterelle (Cantharellus cibarius)



#### Witch's Butter (Tremella mesenterica)



This gelatinous jelly like mushroom is yellow to orange in colour. The shape is variable: usually lobed and wrinkled or brain-like, but can look blob like if they are swollen with water. There is no stalk and they grow on hardwoods.

These mushrooms are edible, but have little to no flavor. They can be eaten raw and are a good snack for those who are lost in a forest (or just hungry on a hike).

Sad to report, two more community members passed away in the last few months.



## Woodstovetop Pizza Dough

There have been many many times that I have craved pizza. Living in Lund does not afford us the luxury of pizza delivery. Once I made pizza just once I realized how easy it is and how much better it tastes than delivery (especially with local produce, a variety of cheeses and wood stove roasted veggies from the garden).

2 cups of flour 1 cup of warm water 2 tbsp sugar 2 tbsp yeast ½ tsp salt

Add flour and salt in a bowl and mix with hands.

Set bowl ontop of woodstove to warm up flour; make sure it doesn't get too hot. Put sugar in another bowl, add warm water, mix until sugar is dissolved.

Sprinkle yeast ontop, also setting on the stove.

\*\*\*\*If stove is really hot you can turn a cast iron pan upside down and then place bowls ontop to avoid breakage.\*\*\*\*

When bowl with yeast and water are ready you will see a head on it, like a glass of Guiness.

Take both bowls off stove. Mix bowl with yeasty water into the flour. When well combined turn bowl over onto a counter and knead it until it's rubbery and sticky.

\*\*\*Make sure you flour the counter to avoid a sticky mess\*\*\*

Set it above the stove to rise (about 20 minutes...enough time for a glass of homemade stout)

Roll it flat and make pizza with desired toppings.
