The UBCM (Union of BC Municipalities) grants have been approved for the 4 projects submitted last year. All four of these projects will be completed by June 2009. The projects are 1) the Lund Harbour Kiosk Improvements; 2) the Lund Harbour Walking Trail; 3) Geocaching Site development; and 4) a Lund Area Brochure. Below is a brief description with the project lead's contact information. Renovating the harbour kiosk to provide better access, more protection from the weather, area maps and business advertising opportunities. Materials needed to refurbish the board include, concrete posts, shakes, wood, black top and gravel.

The proposed trail route will include a 1.5km loop and 10-12 plaques with interesting Lund facts and historical information. Ann will need help with the text for the plaques and installing the posts.

Geocaching is like a treasure hunt using GPS units and is a large tourism sector. This project involves creating 11 land-based and 11 water-based caches, linked via a puzzle, which will promote some of the areas more scenic aspects. Volunteers for needed for the installation and periodic maintenance of the caches.

The brochure will promote the greater Lund area and participating businesses. The brochure will be racked on the ferries and in various Visitor Centers with a focus on growing shoulder season visitation. The 2008 Lund Shellfish Festival was the first project that received funding from the UBCM grant program. As the 2008 festival was a success, we are happy to announce the dates for the 2009 Festival, May 23 to 26. There were 2 other projects that were identified in the first Lund Business Committee idea session, the Lund Area Trail Map & Signage and the Mile Zero Marker. Both of these projects were not submitted for UBCM funding due to their higher costs and the limited amount of grant funds. The marker project is still proceeding thanks to Ann Snows' hard work. The project has the support of the Lund Hotel, Dave's Parking and the Regional District and BC Highways has already approved the markers location. Pricing of materials now underway at which point we will seek funding sources and materials donations.

ORCA BUS Coming Soon To LUND!

The ORCA Bus will bring early childhood development (ECD) programming resources to outlying communities in the Powell River area that will be supported, in part, by volunteer seniors. The objectives are to address transportation and isolation as barriers to accessing urban-based services and quality early childhood programs in this spread-out region. The bus will trave! from Saltery Bay to Lund, a distance of 60 kilometres. including Texada, bringing information, programs, activities and fun to neighbourhoods along the way.

The bus will literally be a vehicle for early childhood development, for learning and connecting, and for bringing services like early literacy supports, information about health and nutrition, puppets, stories and cultural exchange to all areas of the region. Community programs and services - Mother Goose, public health or Sliammon Cultural programs for example - will be encouraged to use the bus for outreach programming.

A project of Success by Six, other partners include MCFD (Ministry for Children and Family Development), United Way, First Credit Union, School District #47 and business and individuals contributing dollars and time to get the bus up and running.

A regular route will be followed that will allow neighbourhoods to become accustomed to the ORCA Bus visits. Our goal is to start programming in February.

The First Step For Puddlejumpers!

In the Spring of 2008 a group of Lund area parents got together to discuss our hopes and desires to have a preschool program running in the "old Lund school".

We met a few times and came up with the concept of Puddlejumpers, a nature based parent cooperative preschool! After meeting a few times with great enthusiasm, the idea of getting it up and ready for September '08 seemed unrealistic and after the summer, many parents had "back up" preschool plans in town.

Fast forward to the Winter 2008. James Thomson School in Wildwood has been hosting the Strongstart program, a drop –in program for 0-5 year olds and their caregivers. As the Strongstart attendance numbers were low, and often Lund kids were the only ones attending, a request was made to the School District, encouraging them to move some of the Strongstart program days from James Thomson to Lund.

Unfortunately having a Strongstart in Lund was not possible, as we did not fit the criteria of that program. BUT the School District did hear our desires to have a trained ECE (Early Childhood Educator) offering a preschool type program in our community. So they have agreed to subsidize the staffing costs of their James Thomson ECE, Cindy Lessard to come out to Lund one half day a week.

Cindy will come on Monday mornings at 9 am, for 2. 5hrs with activites, story time and snacks. The parent group will organize so that Cindy has 2 dedicated helpers every Monday, for set up, clean up and snack prep. The Lund Community Society's Education Fund still has dollars in it to help with supplies and organic snacks and the Society has also agreed to waive a room fee for now, helping us to get things going.

A big thanks to all the community members and School District #47, who have supported the concept of getting preschool/primary programs happening in Lund again – the parents, grandparents and pseudograndparents! Hopefully this will be the first step to more programming for the children in our community.

MusicPlay for Kids

There's a group of budding new musicians in Lund! MusicPlay for Toddlers and Pre-schoolers began at the Lund Community Centre in September on Wednesday mornings and continued for ten weeks, with a special holiday class on December 10th. On January 14th, the class resumed, with twice as many children attending as in the fall. The children range in age from just under one to just over three, accompanied by their mom or dad (and/or baby sibling, aunt, granddad).

MusicPlay focuses on developing and encouraging musical interest, awareness, and enjoyment, while teaching the basics of music, including rhythm, pitch, tempo, volume control, listening, developing a singing voice, using the whole body to move to a rhythmic beat, and playing simple instruments like shakers, sticks, and drums.

Starting with a hello song and sitting in a circle on the floor, "musicplay" aims to give children a positive early experience of themselves as musical beings. Engaging puppets and fingerplay songs lead to standing up and moving around the room to the beat of a drum. There are traditional children's song favourites, as well as new songs suited to their age. The children are given

instruments they can actually play, shown how to play them and given the freedom to make sounds. Right up to the goodbye song, everyone is having a good time.

The benefits of introducing children to music at this age are many. It helps develop their language skills, body awareness and control. If children are given an early positive experience of themselves and music, it fosters self-confidence and increases their self-esteem and social development. It helps the child develop "an ear for music" (that is, an inner rhythmic certainty and a sense of rhythm), through chanting words and word patterns, clapping, walking, and generally moving to the beat. Children are encouraged to sing, and they quickly learn to sing on pitch. Most of all, they learn to associate music with fun.

It's okay to join after classes have started, and drop-ins are welcome, with advance notice preferred if possible. In the future, it is hoped there can be two classes, one for under three's as well as one for three and four year olds. Call Sandy at (604) 483-2395 for more information.

Preschool Climbing Centre



The preschooler climbing centre planned for the Lund Community Centre is happening! But, like some of the best houses in Lund, this project is taking some time.

We have received permission from the Regional District to go ahead with the construction. The structure will be complementary to the Gazebo, with two six-sided decks. The taller deck will be covered, with slides and other equipment to keep our preschoolers busy. The project is being dedicated to Don Worthen in honour of his countless hours of service to the community.

Jurgen Koppen has offered his skills and the use of his shop in Okeover to create a kit that can then be assembled on site at the community centre. With the help of parents and community members, he will be able to plane and cut to size the cedar, the majority of which will be donated by Russ Morrison and Percy Redford. This part of the project should be taking place in mid-February.

The next step will be site preparation. Dave Scherger of Ecoterra Developers has offered to do this at a reduced fee. We hope to level the area in front of the community centre's kitchen, and need volunteers to help rake out the pea gravel to give the kids a softer landing.

We will need many hands to complete the project, building the kit on site at the old school. We hope to complete the project in early spring, while our builders can still find some spare time. Chris Matz has offered his help and expertise, but it will take many people to finish the project.

Huge thanks go out to the community for all the support of this project: the many donations to Don's Memorial Fund, the donations of time or resources from many local businesses and individuals, the Regional District for a Grant—In—Aid, and BC Hydro for a very generous donation.

The New Year has kept your fire department hopping. After a fairly quiet 2008 we find ourselves with not only multiple calls in a week but multiple calls at the same time. Thanks to the dedication of all our members and with the support of our newest training programs we have found ourselves up to the task. However, to help us help you, please have your house numbers (reflective recommended) placed at the entrance to your driveways. Many precious minutes can be wasted as we try to find a specific address in the midst of multiple unmarked roadway turn-offs. This is especially important as most emergency calls are at night.

As many of us complete the first segment of our new training program through the Justice Institute, several of the volunteers are looking forward the next step which is a Live Fire Training Program on the Island in March. This is an incredible opportunity to gain valuable "real fire" experience.

As guidelines from the new Safety Committee trickle down, we are finding the volunteer service a safer environment. We will continue to inspect and update gear and equipment as required and as our budget allows. Due to the large and varied territory that we cover, our equipment is often pushed beyond its expected use.

As mentioned, the NVFD has a very large area to cover and your help is always welcome. Your help is always appreciated.


