## Northside Fire Department

The Northside Fire Department had a well-attended grand opening of its new fire hall. The new Craig Park Firehall is built to BC's new Post-Disaster Standards which means it will withstand an earthquake. It is self-contained with its own well for drinking water, rainwater cistern for firefighting supply, propane, and a generator.

The new hall is two storeys; much larger than the old hall. The main floor has four firetruck bays, a training room, a workshop, a utility/laundry room, and a washroom. The second floor has two offices; one for administration and one which may become a bedroom for any future Paid On Call Fire Fighters. There is also a washroom, shower room, and a small kitchen on the second floor. The small balcony beside the kitchen features a barbecue which was donated to Northside by the Malaspina Volunteer Fire Department. The dishes and cups in the kitchen were donated by the Boardwalk Restaurant.

With more room for training, there is also more room for volunteers. The Northside Fire District (north of Sliammon to Lund and Okeover) is short of firefighters and recruitment is currently underway. Among other things, training includes fire fighting, medical response, CPR, AED, traffic control, HazMat, and Air Brakes, and all training is free. If this interests you, please contact the Regional District (483-3231) for information on joining.

Practices are held on Sunday and Monday evenings, and you may participate in one or both practices. Benefits include an annual honorarium, life insurance, snacks & beverages, socials, and the knowledge to help your family, friends and neighbours in times of emergency.

Still not sure? Come on out to Craig Park Hall and see what we do. Visitors are welcome to watch a practice any Sunday or Monday evening.

A special thanks to Lund residents and the Boardwalk Restaurant for dropping off snacks and lemonade to the fire fighters who battled a house fire recently. It made a big difference on a long, hot day.

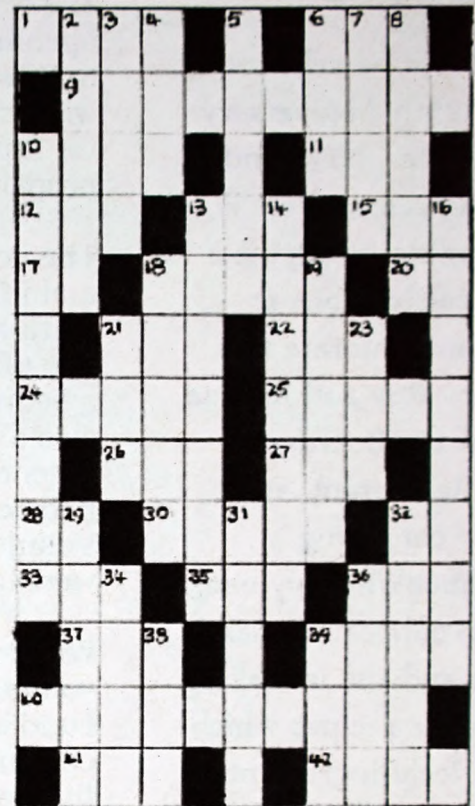

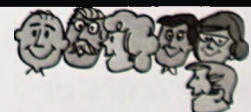

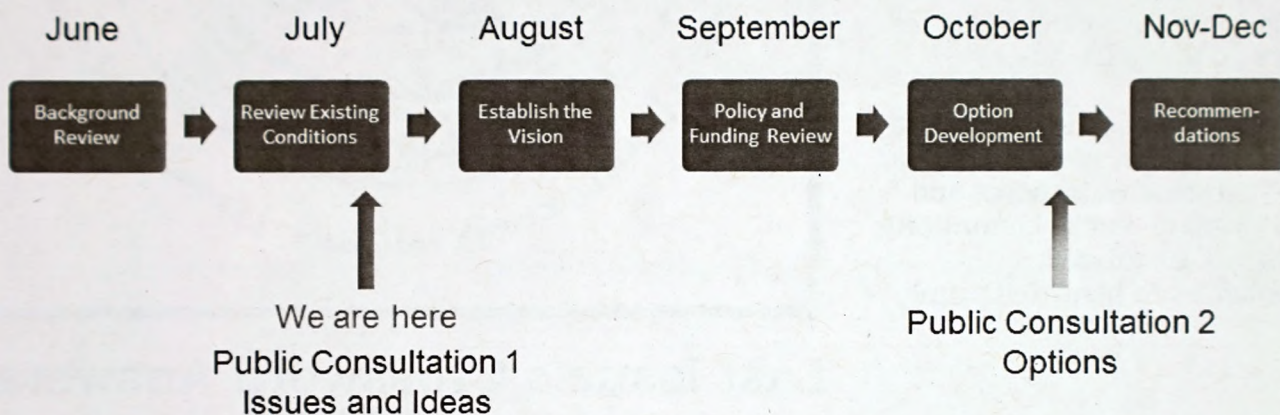


# Regional Transportation Planning Get Involved and Make a Difference!

Transportation is an important issue for all of us. A transportation system must provide freedom of movement and access to services for all residents, businesses, employees and visitors. Transportation is vital to providing a desirable place to live, work, socialize and grow the economy.

Powell River Regional District is working with ISL Engineering and Land Services to develop a Regional Transportation Plan that will guide future transportation planning within the Powell River region. This plan will consider all modes of water, air and land-based transport within the Powell River region as well as connections with Vancouver Island and the Lower Mainland. Your input is valuable and a key part of the planning process. So please get involved and make a difference!

The planning process to develop our Regional Transportation Plan includes six stages:



The first phase of public consultation to gather feedback on issues and ideas for enhancing regional transportation is underway. The second phase of public consultation to gather feedback on options for enhancing regional transportation will take place in October 2013.

As part of phase one consultation, three public consultation sessions were held earlier in July and a fourth session is scheduled for Wednesday August 7<sup>th</sup> (7:00 to 9:00 pm) at the Lund Community Centre.

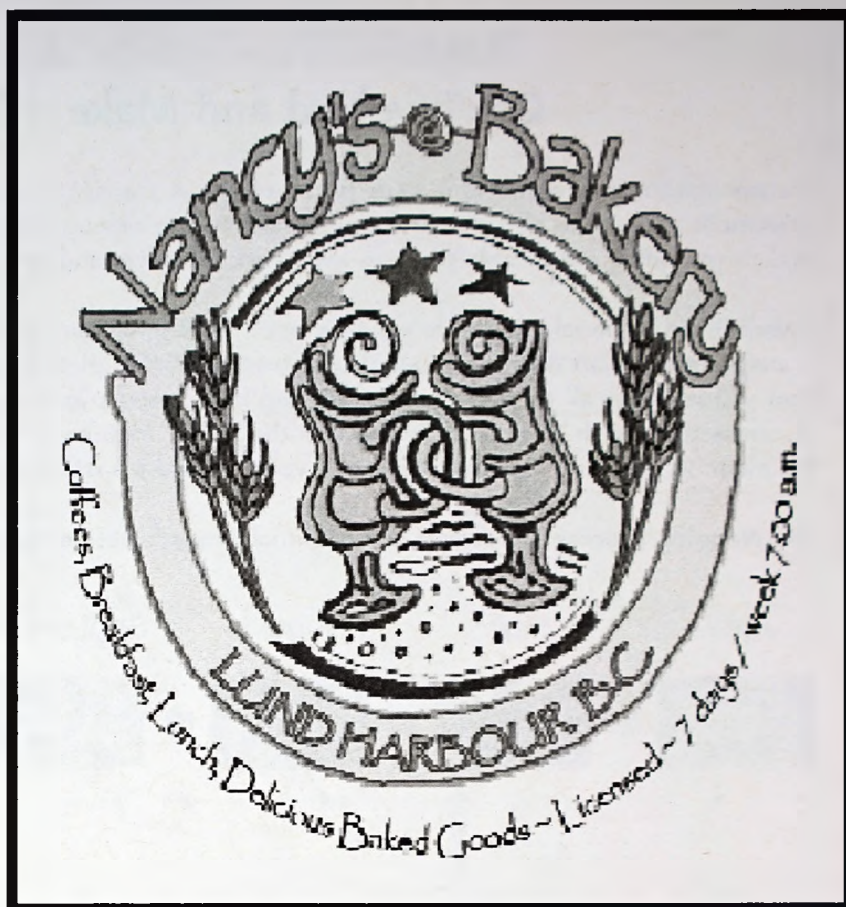


## Sympathy and Condolences
