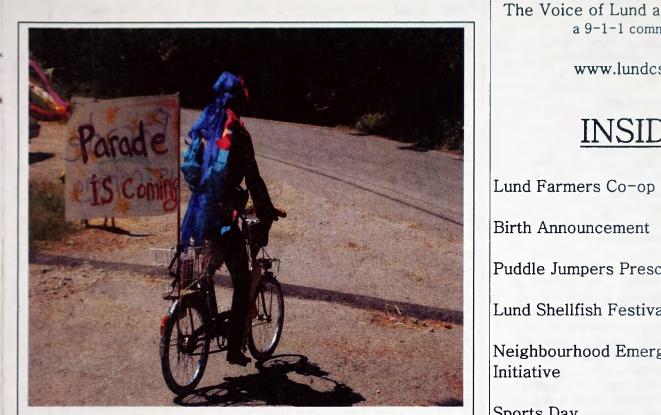

EDITORIAL

Springtime is a season for change, growth and creation. This year feels a bit more intense because of the major shifting of the earth as we've seen in the earthquakes in Japan, China, New Zealand and other places (as well as other natural disasters). The reality is that we live near a major fault line and in a "high risk" zone for natural disasters. I've been witnessing a lot of fear around these changes lately; in myself and others. I have been getting a strong sense to leave and find safer ground.

So what is the difference between fear and intuition? I've been realizing that quite a bit of the urgency that I've been experiencing is fear; coming from my gut. Some of it is my own fear and I realize that quite a bit of it is from those around me. We are all connected, what we feel, think and experience is a reflection of and onto those around us.

Clearing unresolved emotional issues from the past helps with making clear decisions that are not based on past experiences and based in the present. Intuition comes from a place where decisions are based on clarity and from being fully in the present. There are emotions with intuition; however we are not driven to make decisions based on the emotions that we experience. I cannot tell you what your fear feels like and which emotions are clouding your decisions. We all need to take personal responsibility.

It is very important in this time that we be as clear as possible so that our actions be authentic. There are some articles around earthquake safety and emergency preparedness in this issue of the Barnacle and I invite you to read them from that place of clear intuition and not go into fear. What you create in yourself (mentally, emotionally, physically and spiritually) you emanate around you.

Puddle Jumpers Preschool

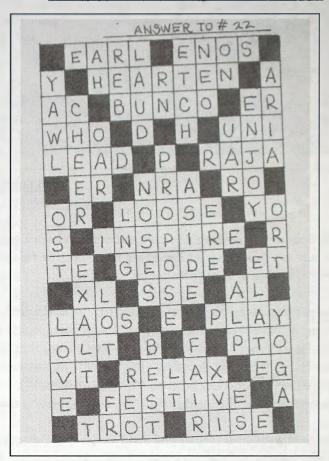

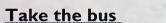


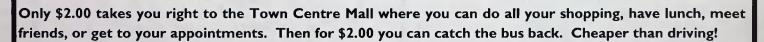
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<u>Lund Community Society</u> <u>Goodwill Committee Spring 2011 Report</u>

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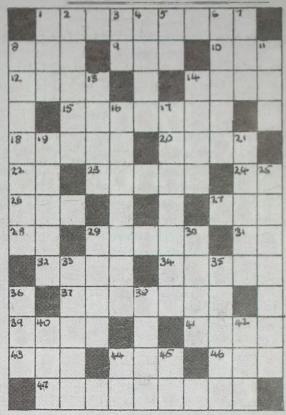

You may have seen signs regarding the Lund Community Co-op, so what is it all about? Inspired by the season of newness and creation, now is the time to assess resources, plan ahead and create goals. The intention of the group is to create a multistake holder co-op with the emphasis around the growing, harvesting, preserving and purchasing of food. We feel as though this will provide the community with more support towards local growers, and opportunity to potentially create our own bartering system to give locals more buying power.

The committee has held two public meetings to date. For those of who did not attend the meetings I would like to share with you some of my experience. Many people gathered to share food and ideas. At the first meeting individuals were asked to speak about what Lund could aspire to creating. The ideas flowed! Mostly surrounding sharing the work load and resources we currently have. We are able to start utilizing the Lund community centre further as the center houses a food safe certified kitchen. There was talk of a resource centre and the offering internet access. We could have an events board, which would post upcoming workshops, rideshares, or work bees. And there are great visions of a community garden! Together we can purchase processing equipment, share freezer space, and buy bulk food. Many more ideas were mentioned! We are in the ideas phase and planning the next action.

In the future we will post meeting minutes publicly and past minutes are available for anyone. We see that starting out in small steps in developing the structure to this co-op will make it more achievable. The ideas shared at these meetings (and elsewhere) can be the seeds we sow to create more dreams around the food growing culture in Lund. Individual's dreams followed through to reality create the collective conscience. We are co-creators.

We plan to attend the upcoming Skookum (Powell River food security co-op) meeting to assess partnering with them. Our emphasis for the year will be organizing a bulk buying group, organizing work bees, and helping to extend the market in Lund (expanding efforts that others have already started by following through on their own ambitions).

The steering committee of the Lund Community Co-op is made up of committed community members who are trying to help answer the question, how can we create a culture around food the supports us all? We are currently seeking advisors to our process and decision making and are asking for those wanting to volunteer or to share input to come forward at any time. lundcommunitycoop@gmail.com or you can call me, Kate, at 604-414-9481.



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LUND FARMER'S CO-OP

Local farmers are getting ready for another growing season so keep your eyes open for notices of local markets starting up.

The Lund Farmer's Co-op is a group of farmers and gardeners that are working together to get their produce to the public. Anyone can join the co-op as a producer, we usually take turns taking our produce to market so that only one of us is at the market and the rest of us can keep working on those veggies. The person who goes to market gets 10% of everyone's final sales to cover gas and time. The only restriction is we want naturally grown, chemical free produce.

We are looking forward to seeing you again on the water taxi lawn in Lund, Fridays from 3-6pm just as soon as there are veggies to sell – look for posted notices at the Lund store and post office. In the summer we will be at Willingdon Beach with the hot summer nights market on Thursday evenings. I am looking for another venue in Powell River to take us through the spring – keep you posted.

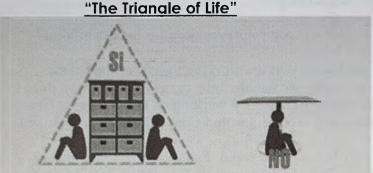
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Tips for Earthquake Safety

Extract from "The Triangle of Life" by Doug Copp

- 1) Most people are who crawl under objects are crushed when a building collapses.
- 2) Get next to an object like a sofa or a bed and curl up into the fetal position.
- 3) Wooden buildings are the safest type of construction as wood is flexible and moves with the force of the earthquake.
- 4) Do not get under a doorway as the doorjamb often falls backwards and you could be crushed by the ceiling or by the doorjamb falling sideways itself.
- 5) Never go to the stairs as they swing separately from the main part of the building.
- 6) Get near the outer walls of buildings or outside of them if possible.
- 7) If you are in a vehicle get out and sit or lie next to it.

Try to remember "The Triangle of Life" during an earthquake.

Are you ready for a big shake up?

Recent events in Japan and New Zealand have me thinking about how we in the Lund area would cope with a big earth quake or similar disaster. Most of us are used to being isolated due to trees across the road, flooding and power outages, but does your family have a plan? Are you prepared to stay at home for 3 to 5 days – do you have enough food, water and a way to stay warm? Do you have a way to cook if the power is out for a week or more? What is the plan if some family members are stuck in Powell River and some are in Lund.

The Lund Community Society has a new committee that is working with Powell River Regional District Emergency Plan co-ordinator and the Emergency Social Services PR to get the Lund Community Centre ready to be an emergency center in case of major disaster in the area. (Anybody interested in helping out with that should give Ria a call at 414 0383). But what can you do to get your family ready? Here are a few ideas to get you started:

-have a family plan- a place where everyone will meet up if phones aren't available to make contact. Make sure your plan includes a place or two in Powell River for family members at school or work can go if they can't make it home to Lund. My kids know of three friends in town that they should go to in an emergency and stay put, that way I know where to go look for them, and I know they will be safe, warm and fed. Make sure everyone in your family knows the plan and review it often.

-have at least a 3 day supply of food and water somewhere on your property, blankets to keep warm. Remember, emergencies happen really fast, you don't have time to round up stuff. Keep a bag or a box in a closet near the door or in an adjacent building, garage or garden shed. Don't forget to include a can opener! -have everyone in the family know a phone number for a friend or relative out of province. During a disaster phone lines are over busy with people trying to make contact. Out of province lines are usually less busy. If everyone checks in with Aunt Marge in Edmonton, chances of getting through are better.

Powell River Regional District Emergency Program Neighbourhood Emergency Radio Initiative

Communications is key in all aspects of emergency management. There has been concern over power/phone interruptions frequently due to storm damage, or in major event (earthquake); how to communicate with outside world and how to call for assistance in times of emergencies if traditional phone lines are down. There are a network of amateur radio operators who communicate via ham radio regularly throughout our region and neighbouring regions so they are already set up and proficient at relaying messages throughout the region. Amateur radio technology is a very resilient means of communication; more resistant to interruptions than land line and cell phone technology; therefore more likely to function when other means of communication fail.

How it works:

-Participating amateur radio operators (hams) agree to act as a neighbourhood communications resource for local residents when power/phone interruptions occur -Emergency Program has built the Emergency Radio Location signs and provided one to each participating radio operator who will put it out at the end of their driveway or other visible location at times when they are able to provide emergency communications for the public

Key message for community:

-This is an initiative cooperatively managed by RD Emergency Program and volunteer amateur radio operators with the aim of making our region safer and more resistant to major emergencies -Residents are reminded that planning and preparing for emergencies is still the responsibility of every person.

-In major events emergency responders may not be able to provide services to your area for many hours or days. Every household should have an emergency plan to keep themselves safe for 3 to 7 days. After building a household emergency plan, residents should consider speaking with neighbours to build a neighbourhood emergency plan to pool resources and ensure that vulnerable people are not forgotten about during emergencies. This Neighbourhood Emergency Radio initiative can be a part of an effective neighbourhood emergency plan

-The first week of May is designated as Emergency Preparedness week – now is a great time to do something to prepare your home and family for emergencies
